

February 27th is International Polar Bear Day

Save the Polar Bear Game

for Early Childhood Learners



Help airlift the polar bears from a melting iceberg to the safety of land.

Supplies

- White tissue paper*
- White paper plate
- Sheet of paper
- Plastic beverage straw, one per person
- Pencil/Marker
- Scissors

To Make

- 1. On tissue paper draw 6-12 polar bears or polar bear head shapes. Size should fit within a $5" \times 3"$ rectangle.
- 2. Cut out each bear.

NOTE: Folding the tissue paper into layers making cutting easier and quicker.

^{*} If you don't have tissue paper, you can use clean white facial tissue OR clean white toilet paper.

To Play

Set-Up:

- Place the paper plate on a flat surface; place the sheet of paper at least 12 inches away, either to the left or right.
- Place tissue paper polar bears on the paper plate.

Object of the Game:

• To rescue each polar bear from the iceberg (paper plate) and get it safely to land (sheet of paper).

How to Play:

- Using the straw and a suction breath, airlift each polar bear <u>one at a time</u> from the paper plate and gently place it on the sheet of paper until all polar bears are rescued.
- Time one another to see who can rescue the most bears in the shortest amount of time.

Team Play:

Note: If competing in teams, make two game sets.

Method 1:

• Team members take turns airlifting one bear each; repeating until all bears have been rescued.

Method 2: "Team Relay"

The first team member airlifts all the bears one at a time to land. The next player
returns all the bears to the paper plate 'iceberg'. Once all the bears are on the plate,
s/he begins to airlift them one at a time back to the land. Repeat until all team
members have played. The winning team is the first to have every player airlift all
the bears.
